THE CAMPBELL PROGRAM

The rich panorama of human history goes beyond telling us where we've been. It helps explain who we are, where we are, and even where we're going. As a result, it's an excellent major, second major, or minor that fits perfectly with a variety of career goals.

Our history majors survey on a global scale all aspects of the human past, giving special attention to their own cultural and national heritage. You'll obtain a sound understanding of European and United States history and acquire a significant insight into the history of non-western regions:

- The Middle East
- Asia
- Latin America
- Africa

As a Campbell history major you'll also become familiar with the concerns, methods, and sources of intellectual, political, military, diplomatic, legal, economic, social, and religious history. And you'll complete a research seminar that provides basic insights into historiography enhanced reasoning skills and introduces the technique of advanced historical investigation and writing.

THE CAMPBELL APPROACH

Our program is applied in interactive classroom settings. We also use our computer center, fields trips, and extensive library research, and we offer an internship program that might place you in one of a variety of museums, cultural centers, government agencies, private firms, or non-profit government organizations to build your skills, your confidence, and your resume for future employment.

Our approach is to make history relevant from both a global and a personal perspective. From your studies, you'll likely develop a more sophisticated understanding of causation; a sense of both the constancy of chance and the present's link with the past; and an appreciation for both historical parallels and the uniqueness of each part of the past.

From that evolves a more tolerant and less ethnocentric perspective on life and an inquisitive, objective mind. It's likely you'll also obtain a better understanding of the role of religious belief in human development, and as you come to a better understanding of the sources of your values you'll gain more appreciation for your ethical and religious heritage.

GOVERNMENT: BACHELOR OF ARTS

Requirements for a Major in History

Candidates for the major in History must, in addition to the general curriculum, complete at least 37 semester hours in history with a “C” average or better, to include HIST 111–112, HIST 221–222, HIST 451, and at least six semester hours of upper-division (300 and 400) courses in each of the following three areas: European history; United States history; and Non-Western history. Candidates must, in addition, complete the following related courses: POLS 229, ECON 201 and 202 (American Economic History may be substituted for the latter). History majors should fulfill the college mathematics requirement by taking MATH 111 and MATH 160. See the current Undergraduate Studies Bulletin for specific requirements.

Requirements for a Minor in History

Students pursuing a minor in history must select a focus and complete, with a “C” average or better, a minimum of 24 semester hours of history courses, including HIST 111, 112, 221, and 222. Those pursuing a minor in history must also focus at least 6 semester hours on upper-division (300 and 400 level) courses in one of three areas: U.S. history; European history; or Non-Western history. International Studies with a Major in History or Political Science The program in International Studies adapts the History major by requiring that more of the required thirty-seven semester hours of history or political science courses focus on U.S. foreign policy, comparative foreign governments, international relations, and area studies and that students complete POLS 471 (Political Science) or HIST 451 (History) as the senior seminar. In addition, the program uses elective spaces to give students additional work in foreign languages, international economics, and comparative economic systems. For specific courses, see the current Undergraduate Studies Bulletin.

Requirements for a B.S. with a Major in the Social Sciences (Concentration in History)

The candidate must complete, with a “C” average or better, at least 48 semester hours in the social sciences distributed as follows: twenty-four hours in history; six hours each in economics, sociology, geography, and political science. In addition to HIST 111, 112, 221, and 222, the 24 hours of history must include at least 12 semester hours of upper-division (300 and 400 level) courses, with at least 3 hours in each of: U.S. history; European history; Non-Western history. See the current Undergraduate Studies Bulletin for specific requirements.

Requirements for Teacher Licensure in Social Studies

Students majoring in either history or the social sciences (history), who desire certification to teach social studies in the secondary schools of North Carolina, must complete, with a “C” average or better, at least 24 semester hours in history and 6 semester hours each in economics, geography, political science and sociology. For the specific courses required, the candidate seeking licensure should consult both the appropriate departmental bulletins and the School of Education.

A Double Major in History and Political Science

Along with guidelines set fourth in this Bulletin in the chapter entitled “Academic Policies,” students wanting to major in both History and Political Science must meet the additional requirements of: (1) maintaining a 3.0 average and (2) taking the History Seminar, and possibly an additional seminar depending on the adopted curriculum (See your adviser).

Pre-Law with a Major in History

Law schools want students who think rationally and logically, express themselves clearly and coherently in both oral and written form, possess a broad education in the liberal arts, and have specialized in an appropriate academic major. Campbell University’s Department of History, Criminal Justice, and Political Science has a curriculum to aid students wishing to demonstrate such qualifications. The program meets all of the college requirements for a Bachelor of Arts degree and gives the student a major in Political Science or History. The program, which is broad enough to give students the specific courses needed to prepare them for the study of law, includes U.S. and British history, political thought, economics, accounting, data processing, logic, national and state government, speech, sociology, psychology, and constitutional history and law. To meet the foreign language requirements, pre-law students, though not required, are encouraged to take Latin. While the program is broad and diverse, no one course alone is vital. It is the combination of courses that is important. For the specific courses required in this curriculum, students should consult with the chairman of the Department of History, Criminal Justice, and Political Science.

History Electives - Candidates must take at least two (6 hrs) upper-division (300 & 400 level) history courses in each of the following three areas: US History, European History, Non-Western History. (Only one NC history course may be counted toward fulfillment of the U.S. History requirement.)

History/Political Science - History majors must select two courses from each of the following groups: Europe, U.S., and Non-Western, HIST 448 and POLS 449/450 meet the requirements for two upper division U.S. History courses.

Science Elective - Can be chosen from any 4-hour science course with lab.

Electives- Any course may be used for an elective; however, carefully chosen electives will allow for a minor.
