In listing the Top 50 occupations with the best prospects for the early 21st Century, psychology was ranked fourth by Money magazine. That certainly makes this major quite viable as a career. Yet, our emphasis is on skills that are applicable both personally and professionally.

As with programs elsewhere, our psychology major is a generalist degree. Areas of concentration such as clinical, developmental, industrial and organizational are developed at the graduate level. About one third of our students pursue graduate study immediately following graduation. Another 10–15% do so after a few years of work experience. The remainder typically serve with social service and youth agencies, children's homes, mental health centers and prison-probation-parole programs.

THE CAMPBELL APPROACH

A typical class size for our major is 25–40, though some courses have as few as ten. This environment promotes enthusiastic class discussions which foster close relationships among our majors and faculty members. We strongly encourage hands-on learning through original, independent research that is supported by computer familiarity.

An internship is not required, but we do have programs that provide numerous real world insights. Our mental retardation practicum typically places students at the O'Berry Center for the developmentally disabled or at a local school where students can work with autistic children. In addition, students can get involved with the John A. Freeman Psychology Club on campus, which hosts a variety of social events and promotes charitable activities.

PSYCHOLOGY: BACHELOR OF SCIENCE

Requirements for a Major in Psychology (BS)

PSYC 222, 260, 267, 330, 364, 368, 369, 461, 463 and 480; four psychology electives; MATH 160; and eight semester hours of science with a lab are required. (BIOL 111 and 221 strongly recommended.) No more than nine hours may be earned through practicum courses.

Students considering graduate study for work in clinical or counseling psychology are advised to take additional classes in biology and mathematics. Anyone planning work in experimental psychology should elect additional courses in mathematics, statistics and chemistry. Those considering the personnel and industrial fields of psychology should elect BADM 331 and ECON 454.

Requirements for a Minor in Psychology

Requirements for Psychology minor are (22 hours) PSYC 222, 260, 330, 364, 368, 461 and one elective.

Psychology 222 is a prerequisite to all other psychology courses.

English Comp – Students with an SAT verbal score below 450 will be enrolled in ENGL 100; 450-699 students will be enrolled in ENGL 101; 700 and above with at least a “B” average in high school students will be enrolled in ENGL 102.

English Literature – The English Literature requirement may be satisfied by completing any two of the following literature courses (in any order): ENGL 201, 202, 203, 204 or 205, or a 300 level Foreign LANG LIT.

Foreign Language – Students are required to pass a 202 level Foreign Language Course.

Social Science – Courses that meet this requirement may be selected from Criminal Justice, Economics, Geography, Political Science, History, Philosophy, Psychology and Sociology.

Electives – Any course may be used for an elective; however, carefully chosen electives will allow for a minor.
