### THE CAMPBELL PROGRAM

The Social Sciences major provides students with a wide-ranging multi-disciplinary perspective by including six-credit hour introductions to History, Geography, Economics, Political Science, and Sociology courses. Students then complete a 24-credit hour concentration in political science or history.

You can pursue this major while seeking a North Carolina Teacher Licensure and it is especially popular with those who have a strong interest in teaching History or Political Science.

This major is also popular with students who wish to minor in another field in a separate department or school.

### THE CAMPBELL APPROACH

One key benefit of our program is the variety and number of courses and concentrations from which you can choose. More than half of our courses are 300-400 level — generally taught by professors with a Ph.D. — with class size averaging approximately 20 students. Moreover, a significant number of courses are cross-listed as both government and history, enabling you to easily minor in this area.

You can enhance your classroom experiences with field trips and an impressive array of clubs and organizations that promote student interaction and leadership. These include the College Republicans, College Democrats, North Carolina Student Legislature, Mock Trial Team, Pi Gamma Mu (Social Sciences Honor Society) and Phi Alpha Theta (History Honor Society).

In addition, all Teaching Licensure candidates complete one semester of student teaching; this provides students with valuable hands-on experience before graduating.

### THE CAMPBELL FACULTY AND RESOURCES

Our faculty members are quite involved in regional and national associations and many have published their research in a number of professional journals.

Our primary commitment, however, is to teaching; we are vitally interested in attracting and retaining good students. Consequently, we spend a significant amount of time on the advisement process.

This helps assure you that you will have the courses and the support you need to succeed. Moreover, because Campbell offers a wide variety of interesting concentrations, students can easily change their field of study rather than transfer to a different school. For example, our Public Administration and International Studies concentrations in the Political Science major are easily exchangeable.

Approximately 25% of our students pursue postgraduate studies immediately; they are repeatedly accepted by outstanding schools throughout the region. While most Social Science majors enter teaching, some also go on to a variety of jobs with private companies, government agencies and non-profit organizations.

## SOCIAL SCIENCES: BACHELOR OF SCIENCE

### Requirements a Major in the Social Sciences (Concentration in History)

HIST 111, 112, 221, 222 and 24 semester hours of additional HIST courses (at least 12 semester hours of courses must include at least 12 semester hours of 300-level and 400-level courses including one course in each of three areas: U.S. History, European History, Non-Western History; six semester hours each in ECON, GEOG, POLS and SOCI.

### Requirements for Teacher Licensure in Social Studies (Concentration in History)

HIST 111, 112, 221, 222, 451 and 24 semester hours of additional HIST courses (at least 12 semester hours of courses must include at least 12 semester hours of 300-level and 400-level courses including one course in each of three areas: U.S. History, European History, Non-Western History; six semester hours each in ECON, GEOG, POLS and SOCI. For the specific courses required, the candidate seeking licensure should consult both the appropriate departmental bulletins and the School of Education.

### Requirements for a Major in Social Sciences (Concentration in Political Science)

24 semester hours in POLS, including POLS 229, 230, 260 and one course in three of five areas: Public Policy and Administration, American Government, International Studies, Political Thought, Constitutional Development; HIST 111, 112, 221, 222; six semester hours each in ECON, GEOG and SOCI.

### Requirements for Teacher Licensure in Social Studies (Concentration in Political Science)

24 semester hours in POLS, including POLS 229, 230, 260 and one course in three of five areas: Public Policy and Administration, American Government, International Studies, Political Thought, Constitutional Development; 12 semester hours in HIST, including HIST 451; six semester hours each in ECON, GEOG and SOCI. For the specific courses required, the candidate seeking licensure should consult both the appropriate departmental bulletins and the School of Education.

\*All prospective teachers must possess a 2.5 GPA overall in order to be admitted into the Teacher Education program where they will complete the School of Education requirements for licensure.
